OUR WORK



£700 END POLIO NOW DONATION!

Banstead Rotary just donated £700 to End Polio Now! Add Gates Foundation matching funds and it will be worth £2100!

One of the international projects for which Rotary is best known is End Polio Now, a programme to immunise the world's children against Polio. This was started in 1985.A joint venture Between Rotary, The World Health Organization and Bill Gates Foundation.



At the time, there were 350,000 cases reported in 1985 across 125 countries.

Last year 2022 there were only 30 new cases reported; which were confined to 2 in Afghanistan, 20 in Pakistan & 8 in Mozambique. In 2023, to date, 5 children have been paralyzed by polio! This is a magnificent achievement, but work still continues to consolidate the eradication by continuing vaccination in vulnerable countries.

As people living in Banstead and Rotarians we are very fortunate to live in a country where we are vaccinated as a right, so long as we make the choices to do so!

Please help in this aim, and, help Rotary and its partners keep Rotary's promise to make sure the last case of Polio is sooner rather than later. Until polio is totally eradicated, every child is at risk of this highly infectious, potentially life-threatening and paralysing disease. There is no cure for polio but there is a safe and effective vaccine. Rotary and our partners continue to give around 2 billion doses of vaccine annually to 450 million children worldwide. If Polio is not eradicated, we could see as many as 200,000 new cases across the world within 10 years. When the world is declared polio free, it will be just the second human disease ever to be eradicated, after smallpox!

Supporting The Beacon School from Banstead Rotary's Fundraising!

During Spring 2023 The Beacon School in Banstead were looking to purchase a 3D

printer at a cost of $\pounds 428.99$ and approached Banstead Rotary in the hope that it might be able to provide funds.

The Beacon School pupils have supported Banstead Rotary in several ways over the years. The Student Council has formed a Rotary Interact Club. As an additional bonus to the Rotary Club, pupils volunteered to help with the annual Christmas Santa collection and this was supported in Banstead by some pupils. As a result several previous donations to the school were made.



In addition to this for the annual Polio Crocus plantings assistance was provided from pupils and a member of staff.

As an additional bonus to the Rotary Club, and as a result of this connection made by Rotarians the school has taken part in other Rotary youth opportunities, in particular, Young Chef and Youth Debates. Both of these activities will be followed up in future years.



Working with our Rotary South District the funds were donated, and consequently an amount for £428.99 representing the cost was presented to the school.

HISTORY OF ROTARY: 118 YEARS YOUNG!

At our recent Charities Cheque Presentation Dinner, our Acting President Jane gave a brief history of Rotary and we thought it deserves to be shared more widely.

On February 23, 1905, Chicago lawyer, Paul P Harris, called three friends to a meeting.

What he had in mind was a club that would kindle fellowship among members of the business community.

Early on, Paul Harris realised that Rotary needed a greater purpose. While he served as president of the Chicago Rotary Club in 1907, the club initiated its first public service project: the construction of



public toilets in Chicago. This step transformed Rotary into the world's first Service Club.

The first Rotary Club established outside the US was the London Club, founded in 1912. There are now more than 46,000 Clubs worldwide in more than 200 Countries, with in excess of 1.4 million members.

Rotary works actively in the international arena, aiming to promote peace amongst all nations.

One of the international projects for which Rotary is best known is End Polio Now, a programme to immunise the world's children against Polio. This was started in 1985.

At the time, there were 350,000 cases reported in 1985 across 125 countries.

Last year 2022 there were only 30 new cases reported; which were confined to 2 in Afghanistan, 20 in Pakistan & 8 in Mozambique. In 2023, to date, zero children paralyzed by polio! This is a magnificent achievement but work still continues to consolidate the eradication by continuing vaccination in vulnerable countries.
